This past March, the Ohio School Boards Association (OSBA) honored Frank Mahnic, Jr. and Tony Hocevar, members of the ESC of Cuyahoga County Governing Board, with the 2010 OSBA Award of Achievement as well as its "Master Board Member" Award at its spring conference in Warren, Ohio.

The OSBA "Master Board Member" Award was only presented to 20 out of 3,400 board members in Ohio this year. It is given to those board members who dedicate themselves to improving their boardsmanship skill and knowledge and is only awarded once to an individual and is recognized for life.

The OSBA Award of Achievement is also presented to a very select group each year. Of the more than 3,400 board members in Ohio, only 93 received the honor this year. 

American History Comes To Life Through Sound

Approximately 70 teachers from 29 area school districts, including Independence Local Schools, benefited from the \$2 million "The Sounds of American History" grant—a collaboration between the Educational Service Center (ESC) of Cuyahoga County and Cleveland State University. The grant was funded by the U.S. Department of Education's Teaching American History Program.

During the four-year program, teachers increased their history content knowledge and historical thinking skills, developed lesson plans and curricular materials, and applied new methods and technical skills in the classroom.

"It has been inspiring to see the great success of this program. I believe it will continue in the hearts and souls of all the participating teachers and the students that have been touched. I am very proud that ESC and CSU were able to bring this experience to the Northeast Ohio area," said Bob Mengerink, Superintendent of the ESC of Cuyahoga County.

"For the past three years, I have participated in workshops on the Civil War, World War I, 1920s, Great Depression, World War II, Cold War, Growth of Suburbs, Civil Rights, Vietnam, the Presidents, Blues, Jazz, and Rock and Roll. All of these workshops have introduced us to materials such as audio and video clips, along with letters, speeches, poems, and songs from those who lived during these events. I have been able to use all of these to bring history alive for the students at Independence High School. This grant also allowed me to purchase more than \$1,500 in teaching materials to enhance my curriculum.

I have also had the opportunity to collaborate with colleagues from across Northeast Ohio at these workshops. We created lessons that we shared with each other and they are now available on a website for all to use. This has been an invaluable experience that has not only helped me expand my knowledge base and grow as a teacher, but has also helped the students gain a stronger appreciation for history."

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North Coast Academy

It is amazing to think that North Coast Academy Education Resource Center (NCA) is celebrating its 10th year of education. North Coast Academy is an alternative high school for at-risk students from 13 high schools on the east side. It is located on the second floor of the Sears store at Richmond Town Square in Richmond Heights. Students who attend North Coast Academy are referred to the school by their own school district and go through an on-line curriculum while assisted by several teachers. The school is operated by the ESC of Cuyahoga County and is in partnership with the Simon Youth Foundation.

Over the years, North Coast Academy's enrollment has increased to serve more than 100 students each year. To date, 340 students have completed their coursework at the school enabling them to receive diplomas from their sending school district.

The school has a morning and afternoon session. They expect 90% attendance and 80% scores on lessons and tests. Students also do a research project and volunteer work. About 80% of the graduates go on to college or the military. "We feel strongly that since this program is giving something to the students, they should give back to the local community," said Rena Wertheim, the school's director. The students also get career counseling and learn life-skills as well as meeting weekly with a social worker.


Richmond Heights

Student Leadership


In November, high school students attended a Leadership Workshop at the ESC in Valley View. These young adults participated in activities designed to recognize and improve their leadership skills.
