Simon Youth North Coast Academy Grateful to Warren and Zoann Little Dusenbury Charitable Trust for On-going Donations

Simon Youth North Coast Academy (NCA), located at the Richmond Town Square above Sears in Richmond Heights, is a school that provides an alternative high school setting where at-risk students may earn their high school diploma. The Simon Youth Foundation and the ESC of Cuyahoga County established a consortium of 13 schools to serve the needs of these students in 2001 with the opening of this school.

For the past five years, the Warren and Zoann Little Dusenbury Charitable Trust has donated more than \$100,000 towards scholarships to Simon Youth NCA graduates who may not have had the opportunity to attend post-secondary education

opportunities due to life's situations. This year, the Dusenbury Trust

will continue providing scholarship monies for post-secondary education opportunities, public bus transportation for economically challenged students, and field trips to area two-and four-year colleges and universities.

North Coast Academy Students Give Back to the Community

On February 28th, the North Coast Academy (NCA) students went to the adult day program located on the campus of Park Synagogue Main in Cleveland Heights to celebrate the adults' birthdays in the month of February. The students decorated and assisted with the party. This past winter, students also participated in a blood drive, volunteered in the kindergarten classroom at Mercer Elementary School in Shaker Heights, partnered with the Jewish Family Service Association to work with multi-handicapped children at Brush High School in South Euclid-Lyndhurst City Schools, and mentored students at Memorial Junior High School in Lyndhurst.

At Memorial, the NCA students explained to the seventh and eighth grade students the choices they had made earlier in their school experiences that led to the need to go to an alternative school. The NCA students encouraged the younger students to make better choices than they had made. The NCA students have also worked with students in **Orange High School's** classroom for students with multiple disabilities acting as peer models to engage the students as they cook lunch together and converse about common interests of sports, music and movies.



Several school districts participated in a workshop at the ESC of Cuyahoga County on Tuesday, February 5, 2013. The workshop, "Speaking to Win: How Mastering the Art of Public Speaking Will Help You in School and in Life," featured keynote speaker Lisa Ryan, President of Grategy.

"The workshop encompassed fear reduction, preparation tips, presentation design, skill development and winning









speaking skills," said Wayne Gibson, Director of Gifted Education for the ESC. The students will now be able to use these techniques in various projects in their high school settings.

Equations Mathematics Game

Since the beginning of the school year, students in area districts have been practicing for the Equations competition which was held February 26th at the Dr. Harry E. Eastridge Professional Development Center. Chaired by ESC gifted coordinator, Stephanie Cutlip, and assisted by Rocky River gifted coordinator, Susan Forbes, the event was attended by eight area districts and over 140 students in grades four through

eight. Students were challenged to devise as many equations as possible to reach various goals. They had to use a set of numbers and operation signs that changed with each move of the game. After two hours of play, students were treated to a pizza lunch through the courtesy of Hyland Software sponsorship.

Thanks to the work of several ESC administrative assistants, the scores were tallied on a computer spreadsheet, and trophies and medals were awarded

at the end of the competition. Awards were given to the highest scoring district as well as winning teams in each grade level division, and individual awards. Participating districts included: **Bedford**, **Brecksville-Broadview Heights**, **East Cleveland**, **Fairview Park**, **North Royalton**, **Rocky River**, **South Euclid-Lyndhurst** and **Westlake**.

"The Explore the Arts Workshop is a great experience for our young middle school artists to extend out of their comfort zones and try new areas of artistic expression. They get about a half hour of hands on training in seven different art forms with professionals in that field. Suddenly, I have 11 seventh graders who love improv, mime, or drumming, and have never tried these before! The information is presented to them in a way they can understand, and they are grouped with students who they do not know so they are less inhibited and get to hear or see some new ideas. The bus ride back is full of conversation about their favorite parts of the day, and what they want to do and be a part of now because of it. I have eighth graders who went last year telling the seventh graders they are going to love it, saying, 'Oh that was my favorite field trip!'I like to get in there and participate with the kids, and I learn something a little different each time I go, too!"

It was developed to increase the awareness and expansion of quality online and blended learning in schools. In February 2013, the ESC and the Northeast QM Consortium were awarded a grant by eTech Ohio and the Ohio Department of Education to offer and deliver training in the QM standards and rubric to the schools and educators in the northeast region. During summer 2013, educators will participate in the Applying the Grades 6-12 Quality Matters Rubric Course. Global Sahucation

Book Talks

A series of three book discussions hosted by high schools in our area focused on innovations in global education. Educational reform in Finland, Singapore, Ontario, Brazil and other areas of the globe that have resulted in high student achievement rates are the result of applying international benchmarking, deep learning, and other education innovations. As Ohio and other states in the U.S. move to new Common Core standards, the ESC of Cuyahoga County coordinated a book discussion series at high schools in Berea and Aurora and at Collinwood High School in **Cleveland** in which participants considered how creativity and innovation contribute to enhanced teaching and learning. Books by authors Yong Zhao, Sir Ken Robinson, and Tony Wagner were on the reading list and sparked discussions that continued at an April 15th conference on the themes of creativity and innovation.









Multicultural Literature Series

During fall and winter, the ESC of Cuyahoga County offered a series of four workshops centered around awardwinning multicultural literature for children. **Cleveland Metropolitan School District** media specialist Gail Greenberg featured award-winning books and innovative curricular approaches to integrating them into classroom teaching. Pre-school through high school teachers created lesson plans that integrated pre- and post-reading activities, research and discussion, and project-based learning using the stories and fables of diverse cultures that teach universal truths. Award-winning books exploring Asian/Pacific, Arab, Hispanic, African-American and other cultures were featured in the series, Lift Every Voice and Read: Choosing and Using Award-Winning Multicultural Literature, promoting literacy and cultural competencies.

Ohio-Ontario Cultural Exchange Project

Richmond Heights Local Schools secondary art teacher Mary Nichols-Brondfield and her students are participating in a cultural exchange with Walkerville Collegiate School for the Arts in Windsor, Ontario. Richmond Heights students have participated in two handmade papermaking workshops at the Morgan Papermaking Conservatory in downtown Cleveland. They are using their handmade papers to make journals in which they are writing about diversity and equity, and they are illustrating their journals with their personal works of art. They will exchange their books with art students in Canada, who are also creating handmade books with recycled materials for the exchange. Drama students at the Walkerville Collegiate School will create skits about culture and diversity to be enacted from the writings of students from both schools. Photos and videos recording the creative processes also will be shared among the students from both countries. Their books will be exhibited and shared with members of the school and community. Kent State University's Gerald H. Read Center for International and Intercultural Education is providing a minigrant from its Ohio-Ontario educational exchange project funded by the Martha Holden Jennings Foundation.



Richmond Heights Art Students Create a Cultural Mural

Richmond Heights Secondary Schools art students—Isabella Gorjanc, Patricia Molina and Malik Hayes—were recognized on March 11th by the Richmond Heights Board of Education for their outstanding art achievements. They took the opportunity to present Board members and Superintendent Dr. Robert Moore with a cultural mural that was created by their art classes this school year. The cultural mural's design reflects their identities and their community's diversity. They identify themselves as students of the Richmond Heights Local Schools, members of

their community, and citizens of the state of Ohio and of the United States. Their teacher, Mary Nichols-Brondfield, participated in a Summer Teacher Institute at the ESC of Cuyahoga County that was funded by the Ohio Humanities Council to explore cultural diversity and the ways that clothing and personal adornment reflect our personalities and cultural development. The students were inspired to design, draw and paint this mural reflecting the cultural values of their generation.





Flip Your World! Creativity, Innovation, and Entrepreneurship Without Borders Conference Brings International Business Leaders, Teachers, Students Together

The first annual "Flip Your World! Creativity, Innovation and Entrepreneurship Without Borders" Conference was held Monday, April 15th from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at the Baldwin-Wallace University Center for Innovation & Growth.

More than 100 students and educators from elementary through college joined leaders from Northeast Ohio's business, non-profit, cultural, and community organizations at the conference to network and discuss the importance of preparing and enhancing our youth in cultural and global competencies required for success in current and future careers.

"While other nations have improved their educational outcomes through Common Core and other reform methods, experts recognize that creativity and innovation are areas that still need additional emphasis in order to foster those critical thinking and problem solving skills needed for employment and success in the global market," said Dr. Bob Mengerink, Superintendent of the ESC of Cuyahoga County, one of the organizations coordinating and hosting this conference.

"The conference featured the exchange of ideas and dialogue through keynotes, presentations, breakout sessions, and informal discussion in order for conference participants to gain knowledge and further develop those essential 21st century skills of inquiry and innovative and creative thinking that are needed in the classrooms today," said Professor Alan Kolp, Interim Director of Baldwin-Wallace University's Center for Innovation & Growth.

One of the highlights of the conference was the morning keynote presentation by Ramanath Ramakrishnan, Executive Vice President and Chief Technology Officer of Eaton. He emphasized the need for preparation of globally/culturally competent, innovative, creative, and problem-solving thinkers and the important role innovation and technology play in Eaton's continued growth. Eaton has eight Cleveland-area locations and is a global technology leader in diversified power management solutions that make electrical, hydraulic and mechanical power operate more efficiently, effectively, safely and sustainably.

The afternoon keynote presenter was Dr. Jane Piirto, Ashland University Trustees' Distinguished Professor and Director of Talent Development Education and author of *Creativity for 21st Century Skills: How to Embed Creativity into the Curriculum*.

A sampling of the breakout session topics included Global Business and Cultural Factors, Economics and International Development, Multicultural Literature and Writing, The Arts:



Culture and Community,

Career Paths: Technical Skills and Beyond, Social Networking and Digital Citizenship, and From Dreamer to Entrepreneur.

Educators attending the conference now have the opportunity to apply for mini-grants to implement their innovative ideas in their classrooms.

Read Center for International and Intercultural Education, and the Lake County Educational Service Center. Now is the Time to "March into Kindergarten" Public Information Campaign Continues to Urge Parents to Register their Child for Kindergarten

The first day of kindergarten can be both exciting and overwhelming for students, parents, and the teacher. A public information campaign is underway, called "March into Kindergarten," to inform and urge all parents in Cuyahoga County that they should register their child for kindergarten as early as March. Registration provides their child with a smooth transition and helps schools be adequately prepared to educate all children and understand each child's strengths and needs before the first day of school.

The campaign is a collaborative partnership among the ESC of Cuyahoga County, Invest in Children, Starting Point, United Way 2-1-1, Family & Children First Council of Cuyahoga County, MyCom, and the State Support Team for Region 3.

While we want to prepare children to be as ready as possible for kindergarten, it is just as important for schools to be ready for all children. From screenings, parent information and feedback from early childhood settings, educators spend time before school starts learning about their incoming kindergarteners to ensure their classroom instruction is designed to reach all students' needs. In addition, schools need to know how many students to expect on the first day of school within each building for the proper assignment of teachers, establishment of class sizes, and ordering of classroom materials and supplies.

For families, early registration allows them to prepare their child and themselves for the specific school he/she will be attending—its building, people, programs, and protocols. The family has a chance to learn the building, become familiar with where everything is, and also obtain policies, procedures, and schedules. Most importantly, the child will be able to meet the kindergarten teacher and other staff. A

child's transition to kindergarten is much more positive when they know

what to expect and who is there to help as they venture into a brand new environment.

March into KINDERGARTEN

"Early elementary educators play a vital role in shaping the experiences of our youngest students," said ESC Superintendent Bob Mengerink. "In Cuyahoga County, our schools educate a very diverse population of students. Recognizing this diversity, it is even more important for teachers to have as much information as possible about each child at the outset so their classroom and teaching can effectively address the multiple strengths and challenges students will bring to the first day of school."

State Support Team-Region 3 Implementing Teacher-Based Teams (TBTs)

Shared accountability and distributed leadership also extend to the work of teacher-based teams at the school level. Data teams, which are teacher-based grade level/content area teams, are a natural extension of the work of the district leadership team and building leadership teams.

Collaboration within and across teams is the highest level of functioning on a continuum of how information, knowledge and working together operate in any organization. The goal is for collaborative teams at the district, building and classroom levels to operate at a high level of effectiveness with the ability to do the following:

- Implement procedures for the effective use of data to assess the impact on student learning and to make decisions about teaching and learning;
- Organize and present data in ways that identify gaps and trends in student performance and require intentional decisions regarding curriculum, instruction, assessment, interventions and professional development; and
- Use data to monitor progress in meeting indicators for the building and at each grade level that are designed to close achievement gaps and contribute to the success of all children.

In order for TBTs to be effective, the following conditions must be present: prepare teachers to work collaboratively, use of protocols to structure conversations, create schedules that support collaboration, make TBT meetings purposeful, define roles and responsibilities, and communicate data.

This work has been the focus of the State Support Team during this school year.

The Wolstein Center at Cleveland State University was once again the site for the 12th annual FIRST Buckeye Regional Robotics Competition, March 28th-March 30th. The Buckeye Regional is a spectacular student robotics competition that promotes the STEM fields: science, technology, engineering and math and adds the soft skills of teamwork, sportsmanship and gracious professionalism.

The ESC's NorthCoast Business Advisory Council and the FIRST Buckeye Regional Competition Planning Team came together on Friday, March 23rd for a VIP luncheon to celebrate this competition. Guests were able to view the competition from the loge and were invited into the "pit" and the competition floor.

The robots are designed and built in six weeks (from a common set of parts) by teams of high school students and mentors. The students program and remotely control the robots in competition rounds.
