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
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


Local School Districts Publish Quality Profiles



Cuyahoga Heights Elementary Teacher Named State Finalist for Ohio Teacher of the Year

Cuyahoga Heights Local Schools' Kindergarten Teacher Dr. Matthew Luginbill was named a state finalist for the 2018 Ohio Teacher of the Year award, in addition to being recognized as the 2018 Teacher of the Year for State Board of Education District 11. The award program recognizes influential and inspiring educators in the State of Ohio. The winner of the 2018 Ohio Teacher of the Year award will be selected by a panel of education and community stakeholders, and announced during the fall of 2017.

An early childhood educator for the past 15 years, Dr. Luginbill's passion for helping students learn is evident in his innovative and creative use of 21st century technology in the classroom, as well as his ability to connect content to real-world experiences. Dr. Luginbill has also demonstrated a commitment to professional development and lifelong learning by recently earning a doctorate from the urban education program at Cleveland State University

"Teachers are changing lives and creating futures – not only for the students, but for our communities, our state and our nation," said State Superintendent of Public Instruction Paolo DeMaria. "The Ohio Teacher of the Year program recognizes influential and inspiring educators who demonstrate some of the things I love most about teachers: they take our system to higher heights and continue the path toward excellence."



Independence Local Schools Language Arts Teacher Recognized for Power of the Pen

In addition to being a Language Arts teacher at Independence Middle School, Jill Wagner is also the adviser to the school's Power of the Pen team. The Power of the Pen is an educational enhancement program that aims to have interscholastic tournament competitions for young writers throughout Ohio. It also assists teachers by providing tools and an educational network to develop better student writing.

Wagner decided to start a Power of the Pen (PenOhio) team at Independence High School, as well. Her team competed last year, taking Second Place in the Junior Varsity division. This year, Wagner added a Varsity level to the team. The teams have virtual and in-person meetings with Wagner, and will compete in two or more writing competitions this year. "We are trying to have high-school writing become more of a competitive sport. Concerning Independence, I am hoping to start a scholarship for future writers and have students earn Varsity letters in writing," said Wagner. Her hope statewide is to add more high-school writing teams.

Due to her successful competitions and hopes for the program, Wagner was chosen to be a member of the United Fellowship of the Pen Board of Trustees. Additionally, she earned the 2017 Ohio Middle Level Association (OMLA) Regional Award for best middle level practice. The criteria for the award are: the nominee is involved at the local, regional and state levels and they promote the middle school concepts through programs, leadership, or research. Wagner will be recognized at the Awards Reception at the 2017 Ohio Middle Level State Conference at the Hilton at Easton in Columbus on Thursday, Nov. 2nd.

Richmond Heights Schools Partner with Ohio Online Learning Program for World Language Courses

This year, Richmond Heights Middle and High School students can complete their World Language courses online. They have partnered with the Ohio Online Learning Program (OOLP) to enroll more than 120 students in multiple levels of Spanish and French. Joy Childress, World Languages Teacher at the district, is facilitating the program offering support as needed with the help of an OOLP Student Learning Advocate. This opportunity, along with other online courses, gives every student within Richmond Heights Secondary School the ability to experience online learning which is something inevitably they will encounter in the future. Superintendent Dr. Renee Willis has indicated that this type of "blended learning" model affords students with various World Language choices that would not otherwise be possible, as finding certified teachers in those areas is difficult.





First Ring Leadership Academy Graduates

The First Ring Leadership Academy is a professional development group for newly appointed administrators and teacher leaders, coordinated through the First Ring Superintendents' Collaborative. Twenty-one educators graduated from the 2016-17 class this past spring. Once a month, they came together to assist each other in advancing their professional knowledge and expertise. They discussed important issues such as poverty, mobility, and cultural diversity. Whether it is providing instructional strategies, building relationships, or creating a culture that supports the academic and social emotional needs of students, teacher leaders are important to our schools.

Congratulations to Barb Curry of Cuyahoga Heights Local Schools and Nia Davis of Richmond Heights Local Schools for being members of the 12th graduating class of the Leadership Academy. Both Curry and Davis presented to their peers and superintendents during the final meeting of the year this past May. Curry discussed the grant she received for sphero robots and a 3D printer, as well as the school's "STEM Coding Club," while Davis shared her views on "Cultivating a Culture of High Expectations--making sure each student knows college is a viable option for them."
