TESTING AND EVALUATION FOR DYSLEXIA: WHAT SCHOOL PSYCHOLOGISTS NEED TO KNOW

This two-day course for School Psychologists focuses on conducting school-based evaluations for the identification of dyslexia under the Specific Learning Disability category. The definition, fundamental facts about dyslexia, and the importance of research-based, scientific methodologies will be reviewed. The course addresses identification and evaluation of the cognitive and linguistic processes rooted in neuropsychology. Presenters will also highlight structured literacy interventions with regards to reading and spelling, methods for error analysis, and strategies to address student needs. Through the use of a dyslexia profile tool, participants will have an opportunity to examine case studies and determine implications for school-based teams.
